SCORECARDS 3: INDIVIDUAL PAR (BOGEY)

FOREWORD

Through our colleagues at the Golf Clubs Managers Association we have the pleasure to bring to you the third in a series of six articles written by David Weston, the former secretary of Enmore Park GC.

The six articles will treat separately the following forms of play:

- 1) Individual Medal
- 2) Individual Stableford (Ladies & Gents for differing Stroke indices)
- 3) Individual Par/Bogey
- 4) Bowmaker (3-Ball Team)
- 5) Pro-Am 4-Ball Team
- 6) 4 Ball Better Ball Pairs

For each there is an explanation sheet and an example of a correctly submitted card.

In all competitions, it is imperative that the player should be able to identify his ball.

INTRODUCTION

For the benefit of the PLAYER and those members of the Competitions Committee or Professional Staff who have to check that Cards in all types of competitions, it is important that the score cards have been correctly marked and submitted. This sequence has been devised to try to ensure that all Competitive Cards fulfill the requirements of the Rules of Golf.

In those Competitions where a computer is in use, the computer will total the Medal score, calculate the Stableford score or work out the Bogey/Par result.

The most common errors are:

- a) The GROSS SCORE is absent or something other than, or in addition to, the GROSS SCORE is included in the box for the Player; and/or
- b) The PLAYING HANDICAP of the player is not recorded on the card; and/or
- c) The SIGNATURE of either the Player or the Marker is missing.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE COMMITTEE (Rule 33) AND OF THE PLAYER (Rule 6)

The obligations of the Committee and of the player are exactly the same as they are for Medal golf – please refer to the first publication in this series.

It is strictly the responsibility of the committee to calculate from the recorded gross score if the hole has been won (+), halved (0) or lost (-).

In reality, however it is unrealistic to expect a volunteer Committee to make out every card during the competitive season. Most golfers will take only a minute or so to fill in the following details on their card, and their help in this way is much appreciated. At the end of the game and before submitting the score card to the Committee, each player is therefore requested to:

- a) Check with his marker that the gross score for each hole is correct [*Tip: if both cards have been filled in correctly by placing one card against the other it is easy to see if the gross score on each hole tallies*];
- b) Apply the handicap on each hole according to the Stroke Index of each hole to determine if the hole has been won (+), halved (0) or lost (-).
- c) Add up the total points for each 9 holes and the total points for the round.

It is important to remember that any incorrectness in the calculation of the points or in the addition of the points will not disqualify the player. The player will be disqualified if he returns a wrong gross score for a hole.

PAR (BOGEY)

In this type of competition, each player is playing against the par of the course:

Nett birdie or better	=	a win and recorded with a “ + ” sign
Nett par	=	a half and recorded with a “ 0 ” sign
Nett bogey or worse	=	a loss and recorded with a “ – ” sign

Although the players cannot be obliged to pick up if they cannot score, it is advisable that players do not proceed to hole out in these circumstances so that the pace of play would not be slowed down. A par competition should be the fastest individual form of golf.

The player’s scoring column should contain only the gross score for the hole as in Medal play. Similarly, the marker’s scoring column should contain only the gross score for the hole as in Medal play.

Prior to starting the player may put a mark or cross at the side of each hole at which he/she is entitled to a stroke and 2 marks or crosses at each hole where there is an entitlement of 2 shots. Some players prefer to circle or double circle the square. This makes it easier for the marker to calculate the points for the hole and record it in the column provided.

Finally, always submit your card, even if it is no return (N/R) as the Committee finishing the competition needs the number of entries to tally with the cards received in order to calculate the CSS of the competition.

The following is an example of how to correctly mark a card for an individual par (bogey) round.
